



PARENT FORUM 04.06.2025 Thank you to all those who submitted questions and queries to the Parent Forum. It is really great to see parents engaging. These questions have been discussed by the Governors at our recent Governing Body meeting. Please find below the questions and responses.	
Can we return to face to face parents' evenings?	There are pros and cons to both face to face and virtual parents evenings. However, having given this great consideration, we are aware that virtual parents' evenings are much more inclusive as we have a significantly higher percentage of working parents who are now able to attend meetings. We have seen a dramatic increase in meetings where both parents are able to attend with minimal impact on working arrangements. We offer other opportunities throughout the year to meet with the teacher face to face, such as parent drop ins, and we would like to remind all parents that should you ever need a 1:1 conversation with the class teacher, this can be booked through the school office.
	We will be sending out a survey in the newsletter to get parent feedback on face-to-face vs virtual learning reviews but we will be requesting a 100% return on this survey in order to make an informed decision.
Why are you not using sustainable gifts for Special Person's day sales?	Firstly, we do sell sustainable gifts for our Special Person's Day events. These include plants sourced from local nurseries, as well as a range of thoughtfully-selected products from other local suppliers.
The gifts you sell lack sentimental value and are often discarded/donated.	Our team of PATCH volunteers work exceptionally hard throughout the year to carefully select items that are not only meaningful but also practical. This includes gardening sets, barbecue kits and other keepsakes which can be treasured. We have always received really lovely feedback about the selection of gifts available.
	Furthermore, the PATCH team are deeply mindful of the throwaway society that surrounds us and the importance of needing to recycle and reuse. As a result, the team have consciously chosen to introduce a Secret Santa regifting window every year where any unwanted gifts families gather from events such as birthdays, Christmas and other occasions can be donated for our very popular Secret Santa event.
Can you make home-made gifts in school time?	I must emphasise that Special Person's Day has always been and will continue to be <b>entirely voluntary</b> . No child is ever required to participate in making a gift for a 'Special Person', especially given that there are many children across the school whose personal circumstances may mean this causes unnecessary distress. For this reason and to delicately manage a wide variety of personal circumstances, this event will remain one that families can choose to opt in or out of.

What will you do?	On reflection, our PATCH Team wish to share that this event has always been highly successful, well-appreciated and an absolute favourite for the children and those who choose to take part have always taken real joy in selecting a gift for their special someone. We will, of course, be really mindful to continue to approach local suppliers and companies and see if we can source any further sustainable alternatives.

Acknowledging Team Patch	Finally, it is highly relevant that the parent community recognises that a very small group of volunteers run PATCH and many of these volunteers also work full time. Their efforts are highly appreciated and the legacy they leave behind for our school is so greatly appreciated. Without them, the wonderful extras that make our school unique, such as the brand new play equipment, simply wouldn't exist.
	This team try their utmost to source gifts which they know the children enjoy purchasing and sharing and this preparation is ongoing throughout the year, every year. It involves taking advantages of the seasonal sales, contacting numerous local businesses, searching the internet and being highly creative in their efforts to make enjoyable experiences for the children whilst also raising vital funds for the school. I cannot thank them enough for the huge amount of effort and dedication they show to our school and we should all recognise that their work makes a real difference to the lives of our children.
	As you will know, we are always on the lookout for volunteers to assist with PATCH and if anyone believes they can source gifts which we can sell at a price point of £3.00 whilst also securing a profit, they are warmly encouraged to get in touch with the office and let us know.
What is the point of attendance awards?	Attendance awards As you may be aware, all schools are set very clear expectations by the Department for Education regarding attendance. The national recommended attendance benchmark is 97% and students and all schools are duty-bound to put systems and processes in place to ensure we meet these targets. In fact, the newly-proposed, Ofsted Inspection framework has committed an entire category to attendance alone and this is an acknowledgement of the attendance priority for all schools across the country.
	Whilst we do have attendance awards in school to promote and celebrate attendance, these form just one part of the package of support we implement at Hordle to address our standards of attendance which remain a school priority.
	<b>Celebrating Attendance</b> We always aspire to encourage and celebrate attendance. However, we have been mindful to review our attendance certificates and this year, for the first time, we have made an important change: attendance certificates are now awarded <b>termly</b> , as well as annually. This means that if a child has a period of illness in one term, they still have an opportunity to be recognised in the following term. In a sense, the "clock" resets, and every child has a chance to

be celebrated for improvement on a termly basis as well as end of year certificates.
This change has already made a noticeable difference, allowing children who might previously have missed out to be acknowledged for their attendance.
In addition to celebrating individual pupils' attendance, we have also introduced whole-class attendance awards. These give the children a collective sense of achievement, not just one for individuals.
<b>Celebrating other Achievements</b> It is important for children and parents to know that attendance awards are only one way that we celebrate children's achievements at Hordle. Children have many opportunities to be recognised and rewarded across many areas of school life, including:

'That they may have life; life in all its fullness' is at the centre of everything we do here at Hordle. We want to ensure that every child has the potential to shine, and strive to provide as many opportunities as possible for them to feel valued and proud of their achievements.
